Subhadra Mitra Channa is Reader in Social Anthropology at the University of Delhi. Her PhD fieldwork on Dhobis in Delhi was published as *Tradition and Rationality in Economic Behaviour* (1985, Cosmo Publications, Delhi). She has also done fieldwork in Rajasthan, Haryana, and Garhwal in northern India with a particular emphasis on political aspects of caste relationships, the position of low castes, and gender relations. Of late she has been interested in studying a community's relationship to its environment from a cognitive perspective. She was the President of the Indian Anthropological Association 1997-2000.
